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
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
CPWE Resident Rotation Experience Survey

- Goals for CPWE
 - Expand the availability of mental health resources by developing training opportunities and supervising residents at facilities operated by LMHAs and community mental health providers
 - Increase the number of Texas-trained psychiatry residents who work in the public mental health system upon completion of their residencies



CPWE Survey Respondents (Dec. 2022 – Oct. 2024)









More difficult to navigate system than other rotations



CPWE Rotation Survey: Satisfaction by Hours Worked per Week (Dec. 2022 – Oct. 2024)


I would recommend this rotation to other residents.

The rotation provided me with an excellent educational opportunity.



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Experiences that Impacted Trainees Interest in Community Psychiatry

- Residents are not supervised by community psychiatrists, so <u>experience is similar</u> to academic clinic
- Host site doesn't work to <u>fully integrate</u> resident
 - Unfamiliar with how to help patients navigate patient assistance programs, make internal referrals, or collaborate with mobile crisis (theme)
- <u>Lack of access</u> to targeted therapy and array of support services (nutrition, club programs) in the community limited outcomes (theme)
- Difficulty navigating systems (EMR, time for appointments, lack of clinical assistance)
- Dislike of telehealth experience



Experiences that Impacted Trainees Interest in Community Psychiatry

- This rotation allowed me to see patients in a <u>wide array of settings</u> from residential, telepsychiatry to schools, and even going to patient's houses. I liked the variety that community psychiatry has
- It was invaluable to learn how to provide <u>primary care</u> to patients with mental health conditions as it forced me to understand not only psychiatric medications but medications that most patients (mental health illness or not) will be on
- The <u>diversity and complexity</u> of patients and their family systems added an invaluable quality to this training experience (theme)
- Opportunity to work with <u>multiple disciplines</u> in teambased structure
- Saw <u>the need for C/A Psychiatry</u> and the impact that they have
- 1 to 1 learner teacher experience



Key Lessons Learned on Rotation



- One of the best experiences I had was getting to work with patients for whom it was <u>their first time</u> engaging with psychiatry and seeing their improvement over the course of time. Alongside this is the opportunity to get to <u>spend more</u> <u>time</u> with patients and getting to know their stories
- I appreciated working within community mental health setting and the <u>wealth of integrated care</u> it provided for our patients - the private clinics we worked at did not have such access to counseling, case management, substance use treatment, etc.
- Lessons learned 1) Patient's tend to improve if they receive a <u>multifaceted care approach</u> (medications, psychotherapy, assertive community treatment) 2) A publicly funded clinical setting makes it easier for patients to receive treatment without having to worry excessively about <u>cost burden</u>
- I never liked <u>tele-health</u> until I completed this rotation and now, I see the number of resources it provides to those in remote areas or without means to come into a clinic

Ideas for Improvements to the Rotation Experiences

- More time in the rotation / More time to see patients
- Increased educational opportunities (both patients and didactics) on dual intellectual disability and mental health concerns
- It would be nice to have some lectures right at the start of the rotation going over work up and treatment for common disorders seen in child psychiatry
- In person treatment sessions (rather than telehealth) (theme)
- More opportunities to work with diverse workforce, e.g., peer specialists (theme)
- Initial training on how the agency functions, including how to make referrals and navigate system, and the different specialty programs (theme)
- Improved EMR (theme)
- Consistent attending providing supervision



I was able to connect a TAY patient with counseling and employment assistance. Over the next year, I watched the patient achieve recovery status and remain employed and in counseling.



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
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Child and Adolescent Psychiatry (CAP) Fellowship

- 2-year specialized training in child and adolescent psychiatry
- Short-term goals of CAP Fellowship:
 - Increase the number of medical professionals in Texas who specialize in the diagnosis and treatment of psychiatric and behavioral health issues affecting children and adolescents
- Long-term goals of CAP Fellowship:
 - Increase the ratio of child and adolescent psychiatrists to the child population;
 - Reduce the number of designated mental health professional shortage areas; and
 - Reduce wait times to see a child and adolescent psychiatrist.



CAP Fellowship: Growth in Filled Positions






Sum of Total Consortium Funded Y1 CAP Positions Filled




Workforce Outcomes: Retention in Texas (AY 2023 & 2024)

Post-Training Placement: Serves Children or Adolescents




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Workforce Post-Training Placements (AY 2023 & 2024)
